NEW RECYCLE RIGHT WEBSITE AND APP ARE NOW LIVE!


A new app and website has been launched this month to help the people of Perth to Recycle Right. The new resource (recycleright.wa.gov.au) encourages and assists residents and businesses in Western Australia to recycle, reduce their rubbish and buy more recycled products.

Developed by the 'Recycle Right' education program, the much-anticipated update of the Recycle Right app features:

- **Which Bin** – find out at a glance, what goes in which bin along with what doesn't belong there and the correct methods of disposal.
- **Bin Day Reminders** – set an alert to remind you of which bin goes out on what day for your area.
- An ever-growing **A-Z list** of specific items and what to do with them.
- **Find My Nearest** – an extensive database of drop-off locations or recycling facilities in Perth for items such as batteries, car parts, building/demolition waste, hazardous household waste and more.

The website also provides a Resources Hub of worksheets, how-to guides, fact sheets and templates.

Information on both the app and website is tailored to the full assortment of bin systems found in the Perth metropolitan area: 3-bin FOGO (Food Organics, Garden Organics), 3-bin GO (Garden Organics) and 2-bin.



SUSTAINABLE **GIFT WRAPPING** WORKSHOP

- Any objects you would like to learn how to wrap with Furoshiki

CITY OF MELVILLE CROWNED CHAMPIONS AT WASTE AWARDS

The City of Melville was crowned champion of the most popular category, *Communication Engagement Success of the Year* at the recent 2019 Waste and Resource Recovery (WARR) awards.

Winners were announced at the annual gala dinner on 14 November at the National Maritime Museum in Sydney.

The City of Melville won for its grassroots, ground up engagement program, 'Talking Trash the Melville Way'. This category drew the greatest number of nominations (18), making it a tight race and a challenging judging process.

Over the last 18 months, the City of Melville has spent many hours planning and investigating alternative, more appealing ways to engage and educate residents on all things waste.

The three-bin FOGO trial was conducted two years ago to 7,000 households throughout Melville. The trial showed that council needed to move away from a corporate approach and create a grass roots, ground up approach to engage the community.

From rap waste videos, to gaming apps and interactive information sessions, they have changed the way they communicate.

Rather than just offering the standard three-bin FOGO service, they made adjustments and provided free larger recycling bins as well as offering free general waste bin audits to those struggling with capacity issues. It's not a one size fits all system and their understanding that larger families and households have different needs.

The general waste bin audits provided a great opportunity to provide personalised feedback to households to help them better sort their waste.

Combined, these initiatives have made a huge impact on not only diversion from landfill targets and contamination levels, but also reduced customer calls, complaints and confusion about what goes in what bin.

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BEING WASTE WISE THIS CHRISTMAS



Aim to be waste wise this Christmas and put items in the correct bin:

1. Be sure not to bag or box your recyclables by placing all items loosely and separately into your yellow-topped bin. Rinse and clean items and remove lids. Flatten your cardboard boxes.
2. Sort before you go to your bins. When entertaining guests, provide labelled bins to help them separate their waste.
3. Take hazardous wastes (batteries, aerosols etc) and electronics to your closest drop-off point
4. Donate unwanted gifts or items that have been replaced to charity.
5. Try to minimise food waste, only buy what you need, serve smaller portions and store and use leftovers.

GEORGE STREET FESTIVAL RECYCLING SUCCESS

This year at East Fremantle's George Street Festival all food & beverage vendors were required to use GO2CUP in an effort to reduce unnecessary waste at the festival. GO2CUP supplied over 20 food and beverage vendors with reusable cups, plates and cutlery which, once used by festival goers, were then placed in allocated bins to be washed and used again at other events. Over 9,700 reusable items were supplied by GO2CUP and over 9,000 of these were used over the day. The used items filled over 45 bins! Approximately 9,500 people came along to the George Street Festival and, with the help of GO2CUP reusable items, only 300 - 400kg of waste was collected for the whole day!

Free water refill stations were also made available at the East Fremantle George Street Festival helping festival goers to avoid the purchase of approximately 650 single use plastic water bottles.

Congratulations to the Town of East Fremantle and everyone who attended the George Street Festival for their amazing efforts to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle Right!

Why not use a real tree/plant in a pot and decorate?






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RRRC COMMUNITY TOUR
