WA-WIDE GUIDELINES FOR KERBSIDE RECYCLING WIN INFINITY AWARD

The Southern Metropolitan Regional Council is part of a consortium who were crowned winners of the Waste Management Award category of the 2020 WA Waste Authority's Infinity Awards.

The joint submission from the Waste and Recycling Industry Association of Western Australia (WRIAWA), Cleanaway WA, Southern Metropolitan Regional Council, SUEZ WA and Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) was recognised for the high level of collaboration to address community communications on recycling and reducing kerbside bin contamination. The WA-wide guidelines for kerbside recycling demonstrate a collaborative approach to address the need to reduce contamination in kerbside recycling bins.

"A single list of materials acceptable for recycling across WA will reduce community confusion and, in the longer term, assist to lower contamination rates," SMRC

Chairman Cr Doug Thompson said.

"This, in turn, supports the viability of the recycling industry in WA by ensuring cleaner material is collected through the kerbside system."

A commonly agreed A-Z guide has been developed as part of this taskforce, to reduce confusion and guide householders in correctly disposing of their waste materials into the correct kerbside bin. The A-Z guide is held on the Recycle Right website (recycleright.wa.gov.au/) and app where it is accessible to all WA residents.

This collaborative approach has led to consistent messaging and the program of promotional activities throughout the year with nearly all local governments with kerbside recycling adopting the guidelines.

"The single list of recyclables allows for more successful and consistent education campaigns across the State, increasing their effectiveness," Cr Thompson said.

WA'S BAN ON SINGLE-USE PLASTICS ANNOUNCED!



The Hon Stephen Dawson MLC, alongside Plastic Free July founder Rebecca Prince-Ruiz, recently launched WA's Plan for Plastics at Perth Zoo.

The Plan, to be developed and implemented between 2021 and 2023, includes a gradual State-wide phase out of single-use plastics including (but not limited to) plastic straws, thick plastic bags, polystyrene food containers, helium balloon releases and micro-beads.

The Plan prioritises avoiding single-use plastics and substituting with reusable alternatives wherever possible.

Our panel of guest speakers will include representatives from the Southern, Western and Eastern Metropolitan Regional Councils, as well as the City of Canning.

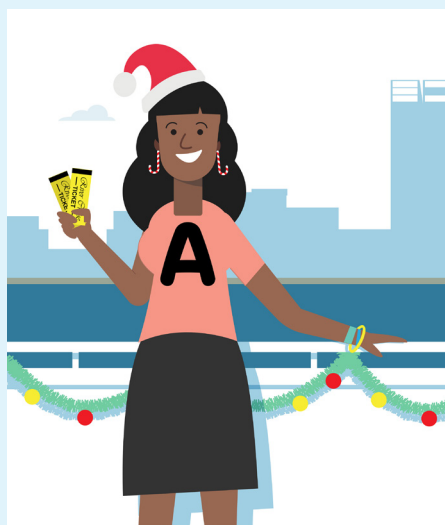

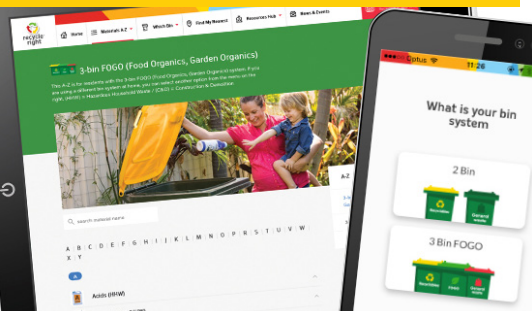

Our Recycle Right website and App continue to help you—the people of Perth—to Recycle Right. Information on both the app and website is tailored to the full assortment of bin systems found in the Perth metropolitan area: 3-bin FOGO (Food Organics, Garden Organics), 3-bin GO (Garden Organics) and 2-bin. 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WHICH BIN? TIPS TO HELP YOU RECYCLE RIGHT

Did you know wrapping paper can be placed in your yellow lidded Recycling bin?

Here are our top tips:

- The bigger the better – large, flat pieces of paper are much easier to recycle
- Try to remove sticky tape where possible or use paper based tape
- Avoid wrapping paper covered in glitter or plastic as these cannot be recycled

Decorations may look great on a Christmas tree but not so great in your yellow lidded Recycling bin! Items like tinsel, beads and other Christmas decorations can tangle in the machinery at our Materials Recovery Facility where your recycling is taken to be sorted. Please make sure to place any discarded decorations in to your General Waste bin or, better yet, save them to use it again year after year.



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
